CELEBRATION OF THE SACRAMENT OF RECONCILATION

On Tuesday evening, some of our Glowrey students celebrated their first sacrament of Reconciliation.

It was a beautiful celebration at St Peters Church and we thank Father Anh and Father Thanh for guiding the students during the experience. Thank you very much to the year 3 teachers for the beautiful and thorough way in which the students were prepared for this special sacrament.

What is the Sacrament of Reconciliation?

When we teach students about reconciliation, the students learn that they can receive the forgiveness of Jesus and the strength he gives us through the Sacrament of Reconciliation (sometimes called the Sacrament of Penance). In the Sacrament, we express that we are sorry for any time that we have 'missed the mark' and we ask for God's forgiveness. Our coming back to God is called repentance. Through the priest, we meet Jesus who wants to forgive us and help us to make things right again with God and other people. Knowing we have been forgiven by God brings us a feeling of peace and encouragement to try to live again as children of God.

MATHEMATICS - YEAR 3

In our Year 3 maths lessons we have been learning about place value. We have been investigating what makes a number odd or even, and learning more about reading, writing and ordering four digit numbers and where to place these numbers on a blank number line.

We have also been learning about renaming numbers, using lots of concrete materials such as MAB blocks to support our learning.

A great game we have played at school and as part of our home learning is a mental computation activity called 'Salute You'. Here's how you play.

Choose a strategy, Eg: tens facts, doubles, add 10 or add 9.

- Player 1 without looking puts a card up to their forehead (like saluting someone).
- Player 2 using the chosen strategy, says the answer Eg: If the strategy is tens facts, player 2 says "6"
- Player 1 says "My card must be 4". If correct player 1 gets a counter.
- The game continues with player 2 aluting player 1 with a card.
- The first player to receive 10 counters is the winner.

N.B: This game can be made harder using 0 - 100, or even 1000! Please have a try of this game at home.

The Year Three students have also been learning about shape, furthering our understanding of the features of 2D and 3D shapes and learning their names. We have been making some models of various shapes and describing their key features.

We really enjoy our maths sessions, here are some photos of us in action.

Understanding the Standards:

6:STRATEGIES TO IDENTIFY AND REDUCE OR REMOVE RISKS OF CHILD ABUSE	This standard emphasises the importance of incorporating robust, structured risk-management processes for establishing a child-safe environment. Consideration of possible risk factors needs to be broad-based and include the diverse range of contexts, environments, relationships and activities that children within a school community engage in.	 ★ Risk management protocols for excursions, incursions, camps ★ Child safe inductions for all staff ★ Online safety protocols
7: STRATEGIES TO PROMOTE CHILD PARTICIPATION AND EMPOWERMENT	This standard underlines the critical importance of schools fostering an environment of openness, inclusiveness and respect where children feel valued and 'have an awareness of their rights and adults' responsibilities regarding child abuse' (State of Victoria, Department of Health and Human Services 2015). Times Like These



Pandemic... War... Climate change. These big world problems are here, they fill up our news feeds every day. Our children know. If they are not tuned into news snippets, then they watch the way their adults are coping with the suffering and uncertainty that goes along with these big problems. Our children try to make sense of these big things because that is what we all do. In times like these they need their adults' support.

Spend extra one to one time with your child/ren. You could go for walks, play basketball, or watch the sun set together. You might find your children open-up more doing these side-by-side activities.

Children need their feelings to be acknowledged and validated. Give them more hugs and hold them close. They need to know that it is ok to feel whatever they are feeling in relation to the big problems, and that they have an adult that can be with their hard feelings.

Children need to know that it is ok to ask questions and talk about big world problems. They need to feel listened to. Don't worry about not knowing 'the right things to say', speaking with an open heart and honesty shows your children you are doing your best.

Children need re-assurance that we will get through this. Wherever there are big problems there are always smart, kind helpers. Focus on the work of the helpers with your children. Some ways adults can support their children who feel affected by big world problems.

Do more kind things in your family and neighbourhood. Show your children kindness exists in the world.

Some children may need specialist support to help them cope with the uncertainty and anxiety that accompanies these big world problems. Some children won't. It is strong to seek support if you need it. Look for active ways to join with others to help out. Support your children to write letters to leaders, or make and share art about the problem, or donate time to provide assistance.

Giving children space to express themselves through play or art when it comes to big problems can be helpful. Play and art can help children show us how they are going and what they need in ways that don't always translate into talk.




INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Students throughout the whole school have been involved in Safer Internet Day. Students have been learning about how to be safe online. Here are some photos of students taking part in the day.













Prep CICT Classroom Agreement
